The Sister City relationship between Tlalnepantla de Baz and Wichita was established in 1973 by Presidente Municipal (Mayor) Joaquín Rodríguez Lugo and Mayor James Donnell. Tlalnepantla de Baz is located just North of Mexico City. In 1975, a replica of Blackbear Bosin's Keeper of the Plains was presented to the city of Tlalnepantla and now stands in Wichita Plaza.



Official visits have involved cross training between Fire and Police departments. Each year, a group of cyclists make the journey from Tlalnepantla to Wichita, arriving in time to celebrate the Wichita River Festival. Many trade, cultural and educational exchange visits have further strengthened our Sister City relationship.




Cancún is located on the East coast of the Yucatan Peninsula in Mexico and is a popular tourist destination. Cancün and Wichita became Sister Cities in 1975. In 1976, there was an exchange of a replica of Blackbear Bosin's Keeper of the Plains to Cancún and a replica of the Mayan Rain God, Chac, to the Mid-America All-Indian Center in Wichita.



The Wichita-Cancún Elementary School was established in Cancún. There are exchange visits between La Salle University and Wichita Friends University. Mayors' delegations exchange visits have continued on a regular basis.

Kaifeng China



In 1985, Wichita and Kaifeng Mayors, Robert Brown and Zhu Zhencheng agreed to establish a Sister City relationship. Kansas was already a sister state of Henan province, where Kaifeng is located. The relationship became official on December 3rd, during a visit by Mayor Zhu. In September 1986, Mayor Brown led the first delegation to Kaifeng.

Subsequently, there have been many visits back and forth in which there have been exchanges of expertise in medicine, English language instruction as well as discussions concerning trade and cultural topics.









Orléans France



Orléans and Wichita formally became Sister Cities in 1974. As symbols of this relationship, a Joan of Arc sculpture from Orléans was located in front of the city library. A reproduction of Blackbear Bosin's Keeper of the Plains was put on display in Orléans.

On April 16th, 1944, the 137th infantry of Kansas, 35th division, liberated Orléans from Nazi occupation. Orléans is located an hour by train, south of Paris. An outgrowth of this event was the begining of a long-term relationship between Wichita and Orléans. In 1949, school children of Wichita sent a 1/7th scale train, built by Chance Manufacturing, to Orléans for the enjoyment of children at Parc Pasteur, where it continues to operate every summer.
